
BILBA learning

Indian Day Celebrations at Mount Clear College

Paige, Addi and Evie visited Mount Clear College as part of an Indian Celebration Day. This was a valuable opportunity for them to begin their connection with their new high school in an informal and welcoming way.

Our students had the chance to rotate through a range of engaging cultural activities, including:

- A traditional Indian welcome
- Face painting
- Bollywood dance
- Henna tattoos
- Mini yoga sessions
- A performance by the Mount Clear College Hindi Choir
- Sampling delicious food such as samosas and chai.

WELLBEING

How to teach Children to apologise.

Have you ever received an apology that the other person did not mean. It is obvious, and it does not feel good! When teaching children to apologise, to avoid the 'fake apologies', there are 5 simple steps.

Practice empathy:

For an apology to be meaningful, the person apologising needs to understand how the other person is feeling. One of the best ways to help children learn empathy is to ask questions about how the other person is feeling.

Think about responsibility

When we understand empathy, we can develop our understanding of taking responsibility. When we ask a child to apologise, what we are really asking is for them to take responsibility for their actions. It is important that children understand the importance of taking responsibility for actions, even if they were an accident. It is okay to make mistakes.

Talk about what happens next

Once we understand the 'what' and 'why' of apologies, it is important to think about how we can make apologies meaningful. A big part of this is the steps to change the behaviour or fix the problem. When we offer to make things better, we let other people know we care about them, and we want them to feel better.

Sorry is not always what needs to be said

Apologies can often become overused, and through this, they can lose their meaning. It is important to empower children to decide when an apology is appropriate and when it may not be needed.

Practice!

Learning to apologise meaningfully can take time. For children, learning when to say sorry and when it is not needed can be very difficult, so it is important to guide your child through this. Investing in a child's ability to apologise is something you will not be sorry about!




